

“Therefore confess your sins to each other and pray for each other so that you may be healed. The prayer of a righteous person is powerful and effective.”

James 5:16

“Will you pray for me?”

Sometimes it’s so hard to get these words out of our mouths ... or off our fingertips! Too frequently we suffer silently, alone, hoping someone will notice that something is not quite right. We toss out hints—so obvious to us—with fingers crossed that someone will pick up our faint signal: . . . - - - . . .(Morse code)

Like an SOS sent inaudibly from our hearts to anyone listening, we say that we’ve had better weeks, or that the rain has us a little down, or that it’s just one of those days, or a long-time personal favorite: “my allergies are *really* bad this time of year.” But we long for someone to stop and pay attention to what we didn’t say.

Please take a moment to read the poem *Please Hear What I’m Not Saying*, by Charles Finn on page 5 of this month’s Mosaix. I was arrested in the core of my being the first time I read this in college. I had no idea that I was not the only person who felt this way.

At the same time, I realize that as you read this, some of you have no idea what I’m talking about. When you glance at the poem, you’ll be puzzled, wondering if I’m just making all this up, maybe that’s what pastors do—try to get people to think or feel things that aren’t real. Maybe you are so self-confident that you really do just say what you’re thinking or feeling and hope others will too. But even you, do you find it easy to ask someone to pray for you?

Regardless of our personalities, I believe each one of us are reluctant to welcome others into the vulnerability that a request for prayer expresses. Often, someone will ask me to pray for them and I’ll ask who else is praying with them about the matter. Not surprisingly (anymore!) the most frequent answer is “no one.”

Sometimes we don’t ask for prayer because we feel that “me & God” should somehow be enough, that our personal relationship with God ought to be enough to carry us. After all, He IS God! But don’t forget the Garden of Eden. “Adam walked with God” before there was sin and God said that it was not good for man to be alone. How much more does “aleness” harm us even in prayer?

The Lord calls us to “*Carry each other’s burdens and this way you will fulfill the law of Christ.*” (Galatians 6:2) I believe that a significant way we obey this command is by praying for each other. That’s why we spent Lent focusing on Praying with the Apostle Paul. You may want to go to the website or grab the CDs and listen to those messages again.

If we are going to become a *House of Prayer where everyone participates wholeheartedly*, we need to pray for each other and welcome other people praying for us. Start small. Build trust. Experience God answering your prayers together.

One of the joys you will have is the leading of the Holy Spirit as you pray. He will bring a scripture to mind or you’ll have an impression that will guide you as you pray. Maybe it will be a mental picture or even a simple sentence or expression. Listen; wait for it. When you share what you’re praying please, please, be humble. DO NOT say, “The Lord told me ...” If He did, you won’t have to; they’ll know it! Don’t worry about being “wrong” either. We’re all beginners!

After Easter, Jesus commanded the apostles and disciples to wait for the promised Holy Spirit. In these next seven weeks, before Pentecost, let’s make it our ambition to pray for each other and to pray that the Lord will send a new and fresh experience of the Holy Spirit so that we may experience His fullness



Hope for America (2 Chron. 7:14) was the theme of the 2018 Fresno-Clovis Prayer Breakfast. The Breakfast took place on March 20 at Valdez Hall in the Fresno Convention and Entertainment Center. Dr. Larry Powell, retired Fresno County Superintendent of Schools, served as Master of Ceremonies. Gene Sperling and Cyndi Franklin offered special music. Bishop Armando X. Ochoa of the Diocese of Fresno prayed for Legislative and Administrative Leaders. Pastor Brad Bell of The Well Church prayed for First Responders. Connie Clendenan, retired Chief Executive of Valley Teen Ranch, prayed for the Judiciary, and Dr. Joseph James, President of Fresno Pacific University, prayed for Educators. Reverend Greg Laurie, Senior Pastor of the Harvest Christian Fellowship and host of "A New Beginning" radio broadcast, was the keynote speaker.

Reverend Laurie explained that we should pray because (1) Jesus commanded it (Luke 18:1) and (2) Prayer is God's way of providing for our needs. He added that the two "secret weapons" of the Church are prayer and the proclamation of Jesus Christ. Reverend Laurie encouraged guests to "get our petitions in line with the Word," which must be at home within us. Reverend Laurie concluded his remarks by outlining the steps of salvation in Christ and noting, "God isn't looking for the religious-type; He is looking for the sinner-type. We all qualify." The next Fresno-Clovis Prayer Breakfast will take place on Tuesday, February 19, 2019. Dr. Tony Evans, Senior Pastor of Oak Cliff Bible Fellowship in Dallas and host of "The Alternative" radio broadcast will be the keynote speaker. MINAS FAIR


FAPC marked the Fifth Week of Lent by holding a Minas Project Fair to fulfill Jesus' Parable of the Ten Minas, a lesson in servanthood, stewardship, obedience, and the sharing of the Gospel (Luke 19: 11-27). In early 2018, the Session gave interested members and friends a Ten Dollar Bill each and encouraged them to use the currency and increase it for the Glory of God. After the Worship Service on Sunday, March 18, the Church Family held a Fair of Minas Projects in the Fellowship Hall. To increase their "seed money," participants decorated tables and

booths and prepared tri-tip sandwiches, espresso drinks, iced beverages, plants, handcrafted blankets and jewelry, cookies, cupcakes, and pastries, along with offering manicure appointments and photographs of FAPC and community activities and settings. As Christian author Warren Wiersbe has written of the Parable, Jesus "teaches that his disciples needed to keep on working. They've been with him three years, and know how to continue his ministry. There would be a need for faithful service in His absence. Jesus is telling them that He'll be gone for a while, until He receives His kingdom. In the meantime they were to invest in His ventures." Those ventures involve "multiply[ing His] message so the entire world will hear it. It is the obligation of believers to be faithful stewards of the message [He] has entrusted us, until Jesus comes." What Did You Expect? challenges you to look into the mirror of God’s Word and see yourself with clarity. Maybe it’s you. Maybe you love yourself more than your spouse. Maybe you love your little kingdom more than God’s big Kingdom. When you reach that level of honesty, you’re at the edge of real good things for your marriage.

Please Hear What I’m Not Saying

Don't be fooled by me.
Don't be fooled by the face I wear
for I wear a mask,
a thousand masks,
masks that I'm afraid to take off,
