



If there is no resurrection of the dead, then not even Christ has been raised. And if Christ has not been raised, our preaching is useless and so is your faith. More than that, we are then found to be false witnesses about God, for we have testified about God that He raised Christ from the dead. But He did not raise Him if in fact the dead are not raised. For if the dead are not raised, then Christ has not been raised either. And if Christ has not been raised, your faith is futile; you are still in your sins. Then those also who have fallen asleep in Christ are lost. If only for this life we have hope in Christ, we are of all people most to be pitied.

1 Corinthians 15:13-19

I'm sure you've been tricked at some point, confused and befuddled, only to have someone shout out, "April Fools!"

One of my college friend's mother would tape the handle of the kitchen sink rinsing nozzle and point it away from the faucet. When she washed her breakfast dishes before school she was so stunned that she just stood there getting soaked! (If I'm not mistaken, Jason Keledjian pulled this one off on his family in high school!)

This same mother woke her daughter up when April 1st was on a Saturday and sent her out to wait for the bus. I can't remember how long she let her wait. Yep, my friend has a mildly warped sense of humor!

Imagine if God liked playing pranks on His creation.

This year Easter—Resurrection Sunday—falls on April 1st, April Fool's Day. For many, the irony will be too rich to resist mocking those of us who actually believe that God raised Jesus from the dead. I can hear it already, "Finally the calendar proves what we've been saying all along! Only a fool would believe that God raises the dead and that your Jesus is a king and not just a pitiful victim of injustice."

But imagine for a moment that scoffers are right, that Jesus was simply crucified and that was it. Would it make any difference to your faith if archeologists found His tomb and could prove the body belonged to Jesus of Nazareth?

Some will say emphatically, "No! I benefit so much from my faith in Christ, I'd never give it up." This follows the path of Pascal's wager, "Even if God doesn't exist, I lose nothing if I believe in Him. But if He does, then I gain everything."

How about you? Would you keep coming to church or reading your Bible? Would you still pray?

If the resurrection is a hoax, would you still follow Jesus?

You may be thinking I'm trying to lead you to say, "Yes! Absolutely! I'm a faithful Christian and if my forefathers died for the Christian faith, then I will loyally believe it, even if it's not true."

Actually, it's the opposite. The Apostle Paul says if Jesus' resurrection is not true that we are the most pitiful people on the planet. Did you read that? Does that surprise you?

If Jesus did not rise from the dead that Sunday after Passover, our faith is wasted. Sure, it may give you "peace" or confidence to face challenges, but if it's not true, you may as well believe in leprechauns or genies or in Odin or Zeus. There are a lot of false beliefs that serve people and meet needs. But Paul says that they're ultimately empty. And worse, we're spreading lies about God if He did not raise Christ from the dead.

I remember laying in a bunk bed at Camp Arev years ago when a young man, newly-arrived from Armenia, told me he didn't believe that Jesus was alive. I responded that then it's good that he was not a Christian. He was a bit confused and said, "Why wouldn't you want me to be a Christian. Aren't you supposed to want that? Isn't that your job as a priest?" I told him that if he was right, that I'd stop being a Christian too. His eyes were getting larger by the moment. Finally, when I told him that the man who wrote most of the New Testament also would have quit following Christ if He wasn't raised from the dead, all bets were off and I realized I wouldn't be going to sleep any time soon. It was awesome!

"But Christ has indeed been raised from the dead ..." 1 Cor. 15:20

There is abundant evidence that it's fully reasonable to believe in Christ's resurrection and I'm happy to pass that on to you if you'd like to bolster your faith with reason and evidence. I'd encourage you to study up and use these next several weeks to prepare yourself to share your faith in Christ with your friends, family, and anyone else the Lord brings across your path. Let them know that Easter--Resurrection Sunday—is not a myth; it's not just something we believe. It's true and because it's true, it changes everything!

With so many of those we love battling cancer or heart disease or terminal illness, it's so good to know that our faith is anchored in reality, on the truth of Jesus' resurrection from the dead. He is alive! So, we have hope and peace from God, not simply our imagination.

Christ is risen! Blessed be the resurrection of Christ!

Deacon's Corner

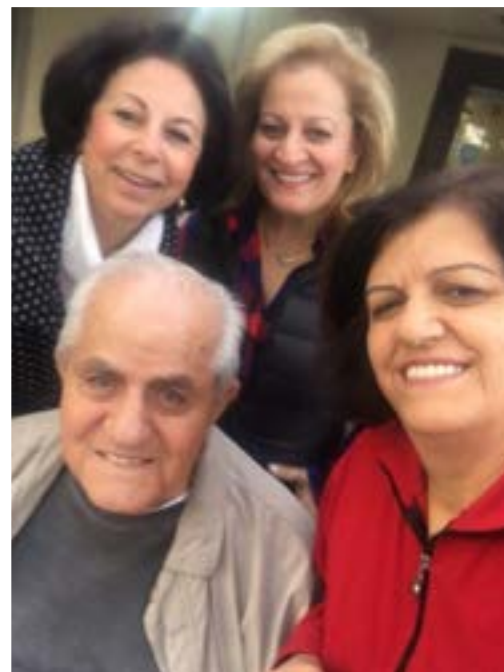
Precious children of God

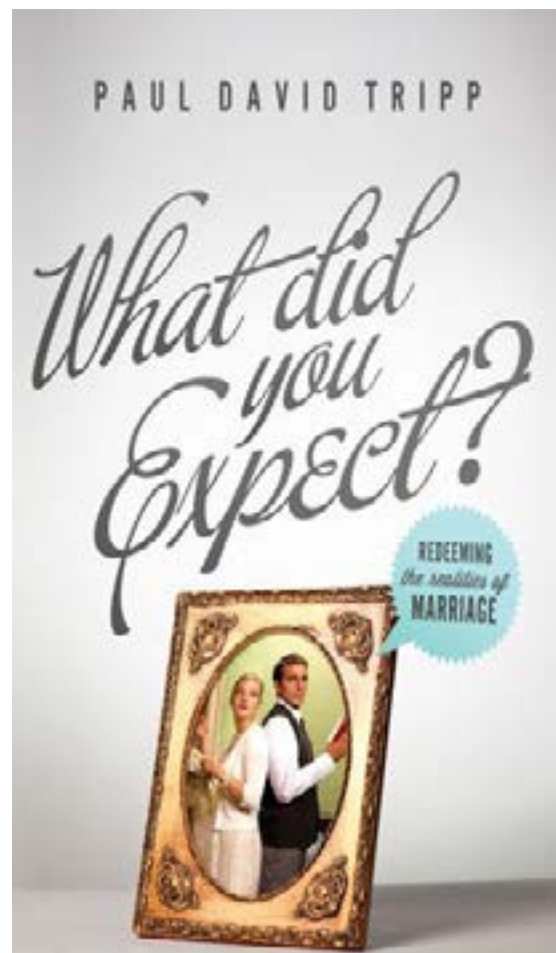

“Be the Man”

More than 50 men spanning three generations participated in the 19th Annual FAPC Men’s Retreat. The Retreat took place February 23-25, 2018 at the snow-blanketed Hartland Christian Camp in Badger, Tulare County. The theme of the conference was,



“Play the Man: Becoming the Man God Crated You to Be,” drawn from Reverend Mark Batterson’s acclaimed book. Reverend Ariel Yeghia Babikian,

AIA, an ordained Nazarene pastor and Church architect, was the keynote speaker.

The weekend opened with a four-course New England Thanksgiving Dinner in the Dining Hall. The men then adjourned to the Sequoia Chapel for praise worship and prayer under the servant leadership of Interim Music Director Jesse Dunbar and Ara Catchatoorian.

Employing a systems-oriented approach mixed with warm humor and a focus on Revelation 22:5, Reverend Babikian explored the purpose, directive, and various roles of a man’s life. The Friday evening session concluded with praise music and prayer and guests departed to play card and board games and sports in the Hartland Gym.

Saturday morning opened with a prayer time, an omelet buffet, and praise music by Jesse Dunbar, Dr. Chris Shamlan, Sevag Afarian, and Ara and Hagop Catchatoorian. Reverend Babikian opened his remarks by asking, “What is my purpose, what are my marching orders?” He went on to explain five steps for Kingdom living: (1) the purpose of life (Rev. 22:5); (2) grace; (3) the prime directive (Deut. 6:5), (4) spiritual disciplines; and (5) discipleship. He reminded the men that “God is training us to reign with Him forever” and shared the wisdom of Christian philosopher Dallas Willard: “We must ruthlessly eliminate hurry from our lives, for hurry is the great enemy of spiritual life in our world today.”

The men adjourned for group photos taken by David Jon Christenson followed by a sandwich buffet at the dining hall. After the meal, the men enjoyed an afternoon of marksmanship under the guidance of rangemasters Sevag Afarian and Raffi Karayan as well as paintball fun in the Sequoia National Forest.

The Saturday night session began with a time of prayer, Yankee Pot Roast Dinner, praise hymns, and a presentation on Safety Ushers by Senior Pastor Greg Haroutunian and Elder Fernando Rubio. Badveli Babikian shared the VIM Model – Vision, Intention, and Means – and the New Commandment (“marching orders”) of Luke 10:27. He concluded the Session by surveying the men about spiritual maturity.

The Sunday morning Session began with prayer time, a lumberjack breakfast, praise music, and a review of the survey results. Badveli Babikian pointed to 1 Thessalonians 1:3 and Paul’s focus on “your work produced by faith, your labor prompted by love, and your endurance inspired by hope in our Lord Jesus Christ.” Badveli Ariel urged the men to “encourage one another daily.” (Heb. 3:13) He concluded his presentation by inviting Chuck Berberian to share his moving remarks to his son, Matthew, upon Matthew’s commissioning as a U.S. Army Lieutenant at West Point in 1997 (Proverbs 3: 5-6). The final session ended with the Sacrament of Holy Communion. Senior Pastor Greg Haroutunian and Associate Pastor Mgo Mekredijian administered the elements and Reverend Babikian offered a brotherly embrace and words of encouragement to each participant.
