

“We all stumble in many ways. Anyone who is never at fault in what they say is perfect ...” James 3:2

We were taught to say it. We’ve taught our children to say it on the playground. We’ve tried to believe it. But no matter how hard we try, experience has convinced us that the old childhood expression “Sticks and stones may break my bones, but words can never harm me.” is simply not true.

Do you remember telling your parents that you would have preferred a punch to being called a name that classmates endlessly and mercilessly repeated? I can laugh now about our family nickname, “harry-tuna-fish” but in elementary school, boy, did it sting!

Unkind words, whether intentional or not, can cause great damage, sometimes for years! Proverbs 12:18 says it so well, *“The words of the reckless pierce like swords, but the tongue of the wise brings healing.”* Daily, actually moment by moment, we have the choice to bring pain or blessing.

What is it about the power of our words to give life and encouragement, and at the same time to crush and devastate? James reminds us that our tongues can give praise to God and curse a person. *“Out of the same mouth come praise and cursing. My brothers and sisters, this should not be.” James 3:10*

What a contrast to what we’re witnessing at graduations!

They may be long, but I love them because they are filled with praise and gratitude! Graduates are recognized, awarded and honored for all their accomplishments. Parents and loved ones, teachers, coaches and anyone who has contributed to a graduate’s success are publically thanked. Students are launched into the future with hope and promise. It’s wonderful to hear all these inspiring words.

But then we return to “real life” and a passing comment or conversation confirms Proverbs 10:19, *“When there*

are many words, transgression is unavoidable”. It’s so easy to let words slip out that we hadn’t planned on saying or bringing up one more thing to make your point that ends up hurting them even more than you intended. You may have been prepared to ask for God’s forgiveness for a “little” bite, but by the time we’re done there’s so much more to confess.

Remember the favorite children’s message about being careful about what we say illustrated by



trying to get toothpaste back in the tube? It never works and it’s not just for children! It’s for all of us!

Once again, I turn to Proverbs. This time the first verse of chapter 15, *“A gentle answer turns away wrath, but a harsh word stirs up anger.”* Imagine how many disagreements we could avoid or even stop before they get out of control if we’ll respond with gentleness rather harshness or defensiveness.

Like James says, none of us are perfect. However, there’s no question that God expects us to come to him in repentance and to seek Him for grace and strength so what comes out of our mouths is a blessing. The tricky part is allowing Him to deal with our hearts. Jesus said that our speech arises out of the abundance of our hearts. (Matthew 12:34)

If we find the words of our mouths betraying and revealing our hearts, let’s come to the Lord, asking Him to cleanse us and strengthen us, so we can discipline our tongues. I’m at the head of the line, so you can fall in behind me! Well, thankfully, there’s no line! We can come to Him for grace & mercy when we need it. (Hebrews 4:15-16)

Oh, Lord! May the words of our mouths and the meditation of our hearts be pleasing to You! (Psalm 19:14)

Courken George Deukmejian, Jr., 35th Governor of California, passed away at his Long Beach home on May 8, 2018 at the age of 89. A native of Menands, New York, he was educated at Siena College and the St. John's University School of Law in his native state. After serving in the United States Army (1953-1955), he relocated to Southern California, where he worked as a lawyer in local business, government, and private practice. He served four years in the California State Assembly, 12 years in the State Senate, and one term as Attorney General. During his eight years as California's chief executive (1982-1990), he graciously received delegations of Armenian Evangelical and Apostolic clergy at the Governor's Office and later sent warm greetings and messages of encouragement to the FAPC congregation during our Five Year Centennial Celebration (1992-1997). Governor Deukmejian was preceded in death by his parents, Courken and Alice Deukmejian, and by his sister and brother-in-law, Anna and Noubar H. Ashjian, uncle of Dolores Armo and Edward Ashjian. He is survived by his wife of 61 years, the former Gloria Saatjian; daughters Leslie Gebb and Andrea Pollak; son George K. Deukmejian; and six grandchildren.



Longtime FAPC Member *Elaine June (Arootian) Simonian* passed away on May 19, 2018, just a month shy of her 80th birthday and 60th wedding anniversary. Born in Selma, Elaine grew up in Parlier, attended local schools, and became an accomplished pianist. She married Gary Charles Simonian at FAPC on June 21, 1958 and became an active and beloved member of the congregation, serving as Sunday School Teacher, Vacation Bible School volunteer, and active member of the Young Women's Society of Fidelis. “What Did You Expect?”

For five weeks in April and May, Paul and I participated in the marriage class that was held in the Fellowship Hall on Thursday evenings. Each week we enjoyed dinner together and then watched two “episodes” of a video curriculum by Paul David Tripp, “What Did You Expect?” We spent time in discussion around our table after each of the videos. The material hit us right where it should when we’re talking about any relationship, but especially marriage: the heart.

We were challenged each week to think about our hearts in relationship to God first and then our spouse. Many times, our discussion around our table moved towards our family, friends and beyond as we realized that our relationship with God really does impact every relationship that we’re in. One of the take-away from the first session that has stuck with us even now, and hopefully will forever is this line: *“I am my biggest marriage problem.”* If Paul and I do not blame each other, but instead look to our own hearts for the root of the issue, we find things will be much different.

One of the other parts of the course that stood out to me was Tripp shaking a water bottle. Seemed like a silly illustration: of course, when you shake the water bottle, the water will come out! But he challenged us to think about the problem in the scenario is not that the bottle is being shaken but what is coming out of the bottle when it is shaken: if it’s full of water, water will come out; if it’s full of acid, acid will come out. The point being: in this life, we will be shaken, but what is in our hearts? Whatever is in our hearts is what will come out: grace or condemnation. We are praying that we will be full of God’s grace so that when the circumstances in our lives shake us, grace will be what comes out of our hearts.
