Colossians 3:1-4

I love my smartphone—even if it’s three years old and getting slower by the update! When I received my iPad on my 50th birthday, I was exuberant! I was ecstatic! I was effusive in my gratitude to my family! A little less thrilled with it yesterday when it took nine minutes to load an app that my 3-year-old phone loaded in twenty-five seconds.

I love Apple products. I even love android and PC products. Pretty much anything that anyone claims to be the latest & greatest in tech makes my “wish list”. How about you? Are you an early adopter? Are you drawn to new tech developments? Or do you have a mild distrust for anything that doesn’t need a pencil sharpener or eraser?

Whether you’re on board with the massive shift in the last fifteen years or not, the smartphone and apps are here to stay ... at least until something even better, more efficient or faster comes along! The real question—which I have honestly rarely asked—is how this new reality affects my relationship with Jesus Christ. How does your smart phone, social media and everything else that happens from your phone impact you and us and our personal and collective relationship with Jesus Christ, the Lord of heaven and earth?



Last month, I listened to a fantastic book, *12 Ways Your Phone is Changing You*, by Tony Rienke. I highly recommend you read or listen to it and engage in a family discussion over the material! Rienke highlights how our phones increase our inability to concentrate for more than 25 seconds. This tendency to distract ourselves is damaging relationships and our productivity.

With Facebook & Instagram, we’re captivated by our craving for immediate approval and affirmation for our posts and we can compete with each other to offer an “A+” version of ourselves and our families. We are tempted to present to the online world a dishonest and deceptive picture of who we are.

Apart from losing our ability to engage in civil discussion and disagreement, our social media experience actually moves us away from personal interaction—especially with people who don’t have our same preferences, opinions, news sources, and “likes”.

What’s ingenious of God, however, is that He’s ahead of us once again. Before there were smartphones and social media obsession, He created the Church. He placed His people in the Body of Christ with all our differences, imperfections, awkward qualities, and habits.

We can try to hide in the church, but face-to-face interaction tends to expose us. Who we are “leaks” when we rub shoulders and share physical space together. While someone may “accept” me as a “friend” on social media and increase our status, our acceptance of one another in the Body of Christ can actually transform us. As the poem from last month so poignantly expressed, our authentic, grace-filled relationships with each other give us the freedom to grow and change to become more like Jesus.

I could add to Rienke’s list of dangers and even to his list of benefits (he loves his phone even more than I do!). But the one that really hit home for me was “FOMO”: the fear of missing out. Have you noticed how hard it is to put your device down or out of reach? We might miss out on something! I’m all for being aware of what’s going on around me. However, FOMO has me exclusively focused on the here and now! Thoughts of eternity or “things above” grow dim and can’t compete with the instant activity and all the notifications on my phone.

You’ve heard me say how deeply impacted I’ve been by Badveli Ara Jizmejian’s prayer reminders on his phone. He used his smartphone to make sure he didn’t “miss out” on what’s most important. He liked gadgets more than most of us. But he made them his servants, to help him set his heart & mind on Christ and His priorities.

Check out the book. Check out of your smartphone intentionally. Do the hard work of self-evaluation—or even better: give someone else the privilege of giving you their input on your smartphone addiction/usage.

Let’s set our hearts & minds on Christ’s kingdom here & now *and* to come!






Mary Mabel (Tootikian) Elia, one of the most senior members of FAPC, passed away on April 4, 2018 at the age of 99, a month shy of her centenary. A native of Fresno, 18-year-old Mary married Joe Elia on Christmas Day 1936 at the Elia Family Home on Van Ness Avenue near Mono Street. For many years, Mary and Joe managed the Marlo Regency Apartments in Northwest Fresno. Mary joined the membership of FAPC on Easter Sunday, April 1, 1945, the day the Battle of Okinawa began in the South Pacific. A charter member of the Young Women's Society of Fidelis, she served as President of the women's ministry in 1948-1949 and in 1950-1951. In 1964, she became a member of the FAPC General Building Council, which envisioned and constructed the modern campus of the Church in three phases from 1969 to 1986. In later years, Mary served as a member of the Board of Deacons and the Church Session. From 1992 through 1997, she was a devoted member of the Centennial Commemorative Committee, which celebrated the first 100 years of FAPC ministry. On October 21, 2017, Mary attended the 120th Anniversary Banquet of the Congregation and was honored for her 72 years of faithful membership. Mary was preceded in death by her parents, Joe and Mabel (Davarian) Tootikian; her beloved husband, Joe; and her dear son, Allen Joe Elia. She is survived by her son, Dennis Elia, and by her grandchildren, Ariele Elia and Britz Elia.
