Welcome home!

Home is where you belong and grow. Its relationships, values and mission form us. You belong because Jesus has called you to follow Him and you said, “Yes.” You believe in Him. He is the risen Savior and you’ve connected with this body of Christ to worship, serve and grow.

As we’ve learned over the last six months, our location is secondary. As a “Church Home,” FAPC has continued to stay connected over the internet with livestreaming on Zoom, YouTube Live and Facebook Live. Since we began in March, we’ve welcomed more than 175, at times, and averaged more than 70 households (125-140 individuals) for Sunday worship. Our members and friends at the California Armenian Home have worshipped with us since early April. We’ve worshipped together with friends from the Middle East, Armenia and across the country. The world changed and we’ve remodeled to make room for the changes! I can’t wait for you to see the equipment that’s made the last six months possible. You’re going to be so excited!

We’ve stayed connected and deepened our relationships in our Small Groups this summer. More than 75 of you participated in person or on Zoom! A Women’s Bible study has continued to thrive on Zoom with more than twenty and our Men’s Bible study has continued strong on a mixed platform, most weeks averaging more than ten. Mommy & Me met virtually through the summer. Our Elders continue to gather virtually in discipleship. We started this on Zoom in March BEFORE the shelter-in-place order. Others are banding together to grow intentionally in their joy and personal faithfulness as disciples of Jesus Christ: **1 to Follow, 2 to Go and 1 to Show.**

As your pastor, I want you to know that you overwhelmed me and our Elders by the outpouring of your practical

compassion after the blast in Beirut on August 4, 2020. You gave over \$18,000, all of which is being utilized to rebuild and restore the devastated community. Well done!!! As the Lord leads, you may continue your assistance via the AMAA. They are doing a wonderful work of ongoing support of our churches, schools and families in need.

Did you get hungry this last month? Did you participate in the **21 Days of Fasting & Prayer**? That has been a tremendous boost to my own prayer life! Dynamic sermons from Paul, Jonelle and B.T. Lewis have been so motivating to follow hard after God and seek Him. Hasn’t 2020 convinced us that we need Him more than ever?! As I connect with local pastors, EPC Elders, and leaders in the Armenian community, we are feeling simultaneously both humbled and empowered. No doubt, we are small, but God is great and He welcomes and inspires us to pray because He will act!

As we begin to open with safety precautions this week, we are so excited to be together—in person—again! We’ve missed each other! After concerted prayer, diligent research, and extensive discussions with other churches and community leaders, the Elders decided that September 27, 2020 would be the right time to reopen “in-person” worship in the FAPC sanctuary.

We had a good response to our “Church on the Lawn” worship. With numbers of COVID infections going down and fatalities dropping even more, we believe that we can reopen responsibly and safely. One thing we’ve learned, both individually and as a nation, is that there is more to health than physical health alone. Isolation from the worshipping community has proven to be more difficult than many imagined. I believe many of our brothers and sisters in Christ comprehend more than ever just how essential gathering as church family is. We’re going to be very cautious and careful, so resist the urge to hug everyone you see! Keep your mask on, especially when you’re singing. Stay a solid six feet apart. Let your eyes reveal your smile and your joy—maybe your clapping too!

The next “new normal” begins now. God has been faithful! Welcome home!!!

In addition to her career in education, Clara was an active supporter of the California Armenian Home, Armenian Missionary Association of America, Daughters of Vartan, Fowler Improvement Association, and the Armenian Studies Program of California State University, Fresno. In the autumn of 2003, Clara and her beloved husband, cartographer Lee Paul Bousian, were named Honored Pioneers at the 72nd Annual Fowler Fall Festival. Clara was preceded in death by her husband, Lee; parents Mourad and Elizabeth Bedrosian; and brothers Ernest Armen Bedrosian and Krikor Yeprad Bedrosian. She is survived by her brother and sister-in-law, Kenneth and Jane S.  Mardiros Diran Afarian, master carpenter, international builder, and zipliner extraordinaire, passed away on July 16, 2020 at the age of 84. A native of Addis Ababa, Ethiopia, Mardiros grew up in Lebanon and immigrated to Worcester, Massachusetts in 1962. From New England, he moved to San Francisco where he worked for Food Service Contracting and built Swensen’s Ice Cream Stores around the world. Mardiros and his family eventually relocated to Fresno where he owned and operated Century Construction. Mardiros was preceded in death by his parents, Diran and Siranoush. He is survived by his beloved wife of 43 years, Maral; his sons, Hagop, Sevag, and Thomas; daughters, Rosemarie Snape and Siranoush Naras; grandsons Christian, Gomidas, Baruyr, Bruno, Thomas, Jr., and Rocco; granddaughters Taleen, Lena, Gioa-Di, Gabrielle, Rosa Mia, Karina, and Julia; five great-grandchildren; and his siblings, Antranig Afarian and Ardemis Teshoian.



John Bradford Smurr, dear Brother in Christ, passed away on September 1, 2020 at the age of 77 following a 13-year battle with early-onset Alzheimer’s disease. A native of San Francisco, John grew up in Hillsborough and San Mateo and was educated at Stanford University and the University of San Francisco School of Law, following in the footsteps of his great-grandfather, California Supreme Court Justice Henry Alexander Melvin, and grandfather, Bradford Morse Melvin. Upon graduation from law school in 1968, John relocated to Fresno where he served as a research attorney in U.S. District Court, Deputy District Attorney and Deputy Public Defender, and partner in a number of Fresno-based law firms. He practiced state and federal criminal defense law at the trial and appellate levels for almost 40 years. His elder daughter shared the story of his battle with disease in the 2016 short film, “Love Zoë: An Alzheimer’s Documentary.” At FAPC, John was a strong supporter and faithful steward of Sunday School and youth ministries. He and his wife, Annette, participated in one of Badveli Bernard Guekguezian’s group tours of the Near East, where they met Queen Noor of Jordan. John was preceded in death by his parents, John Bright Smurr and the former Mary Louise Melvin. The Session and congregation extend heartfelt sympathies to John’s beloved family: Annette; son Sean Henry Smurr; daughters Zoë Anne Byers and Abigail Rose Smurr; son-in-law Micah Byers; grandson Benjamin Grigor John Byers; and his brother James Smurr of San Jose.




