Advent = "Wait-Training."

Most of us think of the season of Advent as the time we get ready to celebrate the birth of Christ. It's frequently our busiest time of the year, juggling shopping, year-end tasks & projects, and—in a normal year—attending a multitude of holiday parties! Oh, how things have changed!

Historically, the season of Advent has focused not on rushing around and getting things ready for Christmas Day, but on setting aside time to intentionally slow down and wait. It doesn't come naturally to most of us, hence "wait-training." Throw in a bout with the novel coronavirus on the literal day Advent 2020 started, and you've got a glimpse of our family's Advent experience, so far.

Honestly, it feels like these last three quarters of 2020 have been an advent of sorts. We've been waiting for a vaccine, for the latest public health directives and weekly COVID-19 reports. Sheltering in place has dominated our year. Doesn't it feel like, since March, all we've done is wait?

That's why Advent 2020 is so important. We have to shift the focus of our waiting from the news—either domestically or from Armenia & Artsakh—to Christ's coming. Quite a few of us have felt abandoned by the Lord in 2020. We've been disappointed and wondered if He really cares.

We know better. We know His promises. We know His Word. But it's been tough.

That's why Advent 2020 is so important. In these remaining days before Christmas, we need to set our focus on *Immanuel*, *God with us*. God not only spoke the promise of His presence and salvation, He sent His One and only Son. He backed up His

promise not just with action, but with **incarnation!** He became a human being, to be "with us."

He has been *Immanuel* throughout 2020 and will continue to be until we see Him face to face at His return or He calls us home. The real question is how can we experience *Immanuel* until then.

1) Intentionally pull aside for 20 minutes, DAILY, to read and reread the Christmas passages of Matthew 1-2 and Luke 1-2. Ask Jesus to be present with you, right now, by the Holy Spirit and ... wait. 2) Ask your loved ones how they long to experience Christ's presence. Write it down and pray this for them daily. Then, wait until after Christmas and ask how He answered your prayers. 3) Find a 5-minute block to wait silently on the Lord. Sit, stand, kneel—I don't recommend laying down! Simply, silently, wait. Don't speak. Don't pray. Listen. Wait.

This won't come easily. But we need this "wait-training" desperately. It's humbling to wait on the Lord, especially when you're not exactly sure what's coming. But it's also super-exciting!!! Just think about how our children anticipate opening their presents!

May the *Immanuel* be your blessing this Christmas and we launch into the New Year!



Margaret Ann (Tayian) Harrison, beloved sister in Christ and the most senior communicant member of FAPC, passed away on December 6, 2020 at the age of 100. A native of Fowler, Margaret was educated at Winchell Elementary, Longfellow Junior High, and Fresno Technical High School in Fresno. While working for California Drapery House, she met and married Austin G. "Pete" Harrison of Brookshire, Texas. Pete's parents, George and Rosa Gureghian Harrison were pioneering members of Armenian-American Community of Waller County, just west of Houston. At the time of their 1945 marriage, Pete was a graduate of Texas A & M University and a decorated U.S. Marine Corps Officer. At the end of World War II, the young couple relocated to

Oceanside, California, Quantico, Virginia, and eventually San Francisco, where their children were born. By the mid-1950s, the family relocated to Fresno, where Pete and Margaret owned and operated HARCO Furniture and HARCO Sleep and Carpet Shop and Pete was the commanding officer of a U.S. Marine Corp Reserve contingent. Widowed in 1975, Margaret was a faithful member of the Young Women's Society of Fidelis, served as a Deacon and Ruling Elder, and was a member of the FAPC Third Phase Building Committee (which constructed the Fellowship Hall), and the Centennial Commemorative Committee (1992-1997). She was also a gifted seamstress who volunteered at Fresno Community Hospital for many years. Margaret was preceded in death by her dear husband, Austin; parents Sarkis and Isabel Tayian; and brother Berge Tayian. She is survived by her son, Keith Austin Harrison, and his wife Patricia, and her daughter, Deborah Kazarian, and her husband Melvin; grandchildren Andrew Kazarian and his wife, Gia; Charles Kazarian; Lauren Hallaian and her husband, Christian; Dr. Katherine Harrison-Chen and her husband, Albert; Dr. Philip Harrison and his wife, YiYi; and five great-grandchildren.
